## Course Description

## Art Appreciation

In this course, students will develop the ability to think critically about human culture and be provided with the tools to understand, analyze, and discuss works of visual art and material culture.

This course is considered part of the IFP (Intellectual Foundations Program) and there are not any prerequisites. The content of the course consists of a topical study of art and art history which takes on a global approach. As a fast-paced, multi-media investigation, students will view topics from western and non-western perspectives that also cut across gender and racial diversities. Students will come to know and understand art in terms of philosophical issues and its function in society as they become equipped with the basic formal evaluation tools necessary to discuss art in accordance with the visual language.

## Course Evaluation Method

## Introductions and Syllabus Quiz (total 5\%)

Each student will 1) post an introduction in the student introductions discussion board (and reply to at least two others' posts), and 2) take a syllabus and course agreement quiz. The quiz can be taken as many times as necessary to achieve $100 \%$.

## Quizzes (total 25\%)

Students will have 11 quizzes, 10 concerning textbook and lecture materials with 1 concerning a Hyperallergic online reading and subsequent lecture. This link will be provided by the instructor.

## Up to Five Written Q\&A's (total 25\%)

As part of the course assignments, you will be asked to answer up to four (4) questions, based on course material. These are meant to be written in a formal writing style, using either 11 or 12 point arial or times new roman font. They are written in paragraph form, with adequate documentation of factual material. These writings take the form of a Word Doc and art uploaded to the Canvas portal.

Ensure that postings contain detailed responses to each question and that course and chapter contents are applied in your discussion responses. For example, consider taking a new approach in presenting chapter content, cite new examples, present external research (paraphrase, avoid unnecessary and/or lengthy quotations; do not plagiarize, cite references). For maximum points, please reference external research or examples as well as the discussion rubrics.

All original posts for each module discussion board must be submitted by 11:59pm, EST, on Sunday. Assignments are normally due at $11: 59 \mathrm{pm}$, EST, on Sunday. ( NOTE: Toward the end of the course, these time frames may fluctuate.)

## Short Writing Assignment - (total 20\%)

Using the visual language of art, this short writing assignment will document analysis of a chosen art piece,

## Final Assignment - Collaborative Video Presentation (total 25\%)

Students will work together with a team of students to create a video which demonstrates their ability to work as a group, talk about art and apply what they have learned to life experience.
