Course Catalog Description

An intensive study of the technical and aesthetic elements of nonlinear digital video editing. Students learn strategies for media management, image capture, sequence creation, title creation, working with audio, video effects and compositing.

Course Overview Description

This course serves as an introduction to the art of video post-production. We explore the theory and practice of various editing styles in order to gain a better understanding of how stories are constructed in the editing room. Through demonstrations and hands-on experience, students learn advanced editing techniques with an in-depth examination of Premier Pro. To further enhance projects, students create animated

motion graphics using Motion or After Effects. Strong emphasis is placed on postproduction techniques that improve the sound and image quality of the videos.

Course Prerequisites

RTV 3531 or DIG 3110 or DIG 3305C with minimum grades of "C"

Course Objectives & Format

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Develop or improve skills in contemporary video technology and operation of cameras, audio, lighting and other television production equipment;
- Achieve critical appreciation for the aesthetics of sound and image production;
- Improve literacy in the "language" of film and video, including shot composition and continuity editing;
- Develop or improve skills in digital nonlinear post production;

All students must be thoroughly work-shopped on equipment by course instructors before accessing. Students must then email scmsproduction@fau.edu to reserve equipment. In the email, they need to state their name, the class they're enrolled in, their contact info, Z#, and the list of equipment needed. Our Equipment Resource Tech will then verify what's available, and provide a pick-up and/or drop-off time. <u>Assignments</u>

Film 1 Movie Trailer (Duration 1:30 - 2:00)

A traileris a fundamental part of promoting a film and getting viewers excited about seeing it. Some say it is the art of "disclosure and deception" as well as an art of

seduction. The trailer brings together the main elements of the film and makes us want more.

Recut a film into a trailer that emphasizes a different genre than the original film. For example, watch this trailer for the horror film The Shining that was recut as a family feel-good movie. For this exercise, you will need to accurately reflect a 'genre' trailer that is different from the original meaning of the film.

In your trailer you can use titles, inter-titles, voice over and music. The trailer will be screened and presented in class.

For this assignment students much first watch the entire film and have a good sense of the story, feeling and original genre.

Film 2 Video Beatbox (Duration 3:00-5:00)

In this assignment you will be recording original footage, create a video that incorporates image and sound manipulation, repetition, and rhythm. The idea is to create beats that flow by remixing images into a coherent rhythmic sound. Video scratching is used to disrupt the linear movement of traditional film and television. The video scratching creates anticipation. Actions move back and forth until they are allowed to play out. You may follow the abstract or experimental approach to the project. Be prepared to discuss the choices made within the context of the video. You can use a track to assist with tempo and rhythm but it should not be where the main beat comes from. The video will then be presented to the class for critique and discussion.

Film 3 Open Concept (Duration 3:00 - 5:00)

In this option, you can go towards a more open concept. You will still need to record your own footage. You can create a video scratch, experimental video, pixelation, any mode of documentary and any other form of production not listed. Continue to keep in mind the style of video and audio editing you wish to pursue. The duration of the film will be 3-5 minutes. The video will then be presented to the class for critique and discussion.
