THE PROGRAM

The **DOCTOR OF PHILOSOPHY IN SPECIAL EDUCATION** prepares leaders in the field. Graduates are prepared for leadership positions in colleges and universities, school districts, and community agencies. Pursuit of a Ph.D. in special education at FAU means more than coursework. Our students also work closely with faculty to conduct, publish and disseminate research, develop and teach courses, and prepare grant proposals for funding. Students interested in delving deep into different areas of study within the discipline of special education (e.g., special education teachers, certified behavior analysts, curriculum specialists) are invited to apply. The program accommodates both full- and part-time students.

Students will complete an original research proposal, study and dissertation. They are encouraged to publish this research.





To be considered for admission into the doctoral program in the Department of Special Education, applicants must complete a graduate application online through FAU's Graduate College at https://www.fau.edu/graduate; select *Ph.D. in Special Education*.

Students are admitted for Fall (August) or Spring (January) entry. Application deadlines for fall are are: February 15 (International) or July 1 (Domestic). Spring semester entry: July 15 (International) or November 1 (Domestic).

ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Domestic Applicants

- Undergraduate GPA of 3.5
- GRE test score of 148 (verbal), 144 (quantitative) and 3 (analytical writing)
- Three years teaching (or similar) experience
- Master's Degree
- Department Interview
- Original Writing Sample

International Applicants

- Undergraduate GPA of 3.5
- GRE test score of 148 (verbal), 144 (quantitative) and 3 (analytical writing)
- Three years teaching (or similar) experience
- Master's Degree (w/course-by-course evaluation of international transcripts if applicable)
- Department Interview
- Original Writing Sample
- Have attained minimum English proficiency scores within the last two years: TOEFL 500 (paper-based test), or 213 (computer-based test), or 79 (Internet-based test); a score of at least 6.0 on the IELTS; or, Duolingo 110.

Completed Graduate College applications are forwarded to the Department of Special Education for a decision. Once applications are received from the Graduate College, students are then asked to complete a Departmental application.
