Policy on Make-up Tests, Late work, and Incompletes

No assignment(s) or assessment(s) (i.e., midterm or final) may be taken late or turned in late except for approved reasons (i.e., emergency, University-approved absence, religious accommodation, etc.).

Assessments in this course are offered and available with sufficient time for students to complete. If a student misses the open window for taking an assessment, he or she will receive a grade of 0 on that particular assessment unless he or she has an approved reason. A student will not be provided a make-up assessment/exam/assignment without a university-approved reason, emergency situation, and until he or she provides appropriate documentation.

Students are responsible for arranging to make up work because of legitimate class absences such as illness, family emergencies, personal emergencies, military obligation, court-imposed legal obligations, or participation in University-approved activities. In this course, the instructor of record deems a reasonable amount of time of 7 days prior to the absence. In the event that the student forgets to notify the instructor, it is an absolutely must to inform the instructor by the next scheduled class meeting. In fully online courses, that is within 48 hours of

return from the legitimate absence. Failure to notify in a timely manner may result in the forfeiture of a make-up assignment.

The instructor of record will permit students missing for a University-approved reason the opportunity to make up missed work at the same level of difficulty and in the same format as the original assignment. Make-up work must be completed by the due date assigned by the professor which will be a reasonable amount of time post-absence. Students who miss for non-University-approved absences need the instructor's approval to make up the word. Only excused absences with documentation will be permitted make-up assignments of any type.
